■ Soldiers and Kings: Human Smuggling, Violence, and the Praxis of Photoethnography

JASON DE LEÓN

In 2014, Mexico (with financial and logistical support from the Obama administration) launched Programa Frontera Sur, a security enforcement project aimed at stopping Central American migrants from reaching the U.S./ Mexico border. Under this program, Mexico dramatically increased arrests and deportations while simultaneously making the migration journey more arduous and deadly. In response to this heightened security, migrants have turned to transnational gangs such as MS-13 who have become increasingly involved in the human smuggling industry. In 2015 I began a long-term photoethnographic project focused on understanding the daily lives of Honduran smugglers who profit from transporting migrants across the length of Mexico. In this talk I use ethnographic data to discuss the relationship between transnational gangs and the human smuggling industry and outline the complicated role that photography plays as a field method and data source in this violent and ethically challenging context.

JASON DE LEÓN IS AN ANTHROPOLOGIST, PROFESSOR AT UCLA IN THE DEPARTMENTS OF ANTHROPOLOGY AND CHICANA/O STUDIES. HE IS AFFILIATED WITH THE COTSEN INSTITUTE OF ARCHEOLOGY. IN 2015, HE PUBLISHED THE LAND OF OPEN GRAVES. LIVING AND DYING ON THE MIGRANT TRAIL (UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA PRESS, CALIFORNIA SERIES IN PUBLIC ANTHROPOLOGY). 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Since the 1980s, neoliberalism has radically transformed the world of sport, as sport clubs and federations have become for-profit businesses, in conjunction with television and corporate sponsors. Neoliberal sport has had other important effects, which are rarely the object of attention: as national economies in the Global South and local economies of marginal areas of the Global North have collapsed under pressure from global capital, many young people dream of pursuing a sport career as an escape from poverty. But this elusive future is often located elsewhere, initially in regional centres, though ultimately in the wealthy centres of the Global North that can support a sport infrastructure. But the probability of success in the highly competitive world of sport is infinitesimal, and thus the migrant athlete's racialized body is suspended between images of the heroic and the abject.
